

# President's Report – SASTA AGM 2020

2019 was another successful year for SASTA. While the number of Primary Members, whether they have Personal membership, or alternatively School or Corporate membership, decreased from 477 to 428, there was an overall stability in total membership. The number of teachers attached to School membership accounts increased from 750 to 791, giving a total membership of 1,219 teachers in 2019, remaining approximately steady in number from 1,227 science teachers in 2018.

Financially, we had a healthy surplus of approximately \$104 682, which represents a decrease in the surplus from that of the previous year, and Marianne will elaborate on this shortly in her Treasurer's Report.

Significant changes in personnel had occurred at the SASTA office during 2019, with Tegan McClean, SASTA's Marketing and Communications Officer taking maternity leave from 10<sup>th</sup> June 2019. Her role was filled by the temporary appointment of Toby Spencer to cover her absence. Kate Dilger has consolidated her role as the SASTA Executive Officer, in conjunction with her role as the SASTA Education Officer, which she commenced in October, 2018. Our OSA and Events Coordinator, Becci van Schuilenburg, returned from her maternity leave at the beginning of January to work 2 days a week.

Members would be aware that SASTA relies heavily upon the sale of its resources for income, and in particular from the sales of its study guides. Study guide sales decreased slightly in 2019 to 9650 from the higher figure of 10 088 in 2018. As with other Stage 2 resources, there had been a jump in 2018 sales figures due to the start of the new subject content for Biology, Physics and Chemistry. Not unexpectedly, in 2019 sales figures returned to a level mostly around those of 2017.

Second Editions of the Stage 1 workbooks for biology, chemistry and physics were released at the end of 2018 for sale in 2019. A second edition of the Stage 2 Biology Workbook was published in October 2019 to respond to significant changes in the Biology subject outline.

The Stage 2 Biology Textbook (Living Science: Biology) was developed and published towards the end of 2019.

A Research Project Workbook and Guide was developed and published in October 2019. Sales have commenced strongly for this new venture outside of our normal science resources.

### **Professional Development**

While SASTA conducts a number of regular conference and professional learning activities throughout the year for all science teachers, the introduction of a new curriculum for Stage 2 biology, chemistry and physics in 2018 meant that SASTA had a particular focus on organizing professional learning activities which would provide support for our members teaching these subjects. In order to support teachers who were new to teaching Stage 2 science subjects in 2019,

SASTA ran five different 'Teachers new to (that subject) Workshops' for the science subjects of biology, chemistry, physics, psychology and nutrition in February and March of 2019. A number of other Stage 2 workshops were held throughout 2019, including Marking and Moderation workshops, and also a workshop which took teachers through the new Deconstruction Practical requirement.

Carolyn Pinchbeck and Irena Atherton once again convened our Psychology Summer Conference in January, and Dr Jane Wright also once again convened our Annual Conference in April and the STEM 6 – 11 Conference in November.

Kate Dilger ran a number of popular STEM based workshops for both primary and secondary teachers in her capacity as Education Officer. Kate also ran a full day of STEM learning for which Early Years teachers were the main target audience.

SASTA continued its tradition of facilitating Exam Postmortems for teachers of Stage 2 science. We thank our generous hosts and the teachers who attended those events.

A free teacher excursion to Cleland Wildlife Park was also held for SASTA members in May.

In addition, Peter Beveridge convened the SASTA Early Career Teachers conference in October 2019.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank them all, together with the members of the Professional Development Reference Group who also contributed to these events.

My report would not be complete without commenting on our Oliphant Science Awards competition. The number of entries in 2018 decreased slightly overall from 2169 in 2018 to 2100 in 2019. The total number of students participating consequently decreased to 2890 from 3010 in 2018, while the total number of schools participating in the Oliphant Science Awards decreased from 106 in 2018 to 98 schools in 2019. Overall, however, 22 newly participating schools entered the competition in 2019.

It is with immense excitement that I would like to announce that the National Teacher Award winner of the BHP Foundation Science and Engineering Awards for 2020 is SASTA Board member Anthea Ponte. Our congratulations are well deserved.
